Khonsu (Ancient Egyptian: ḥnsw ; also transliterated Chonsu, Khensu, Khons, Chons, Khonshu, or Konshu; Coptic: ⲣⲱⲃ, romanized: Shons) is an ancient Egyptian god of the Moon. His name means 'traveller', and this may relate to the perceived nightly travel of the Moon across the sky.

As result of his association with the Moon (crescent moon), he was given the name "Khensu-pa-khart". According to the myth, he usually took the form of a child ("Khonsu pa-khered) in the morning, and in the evening, he turned into an old man.
