It held that language is not a transparent medium that connects one directly with a 'truth' or 'reality' outside it but rather a structure or code, whose parts derive their meaning from their contrast with one another.

Having originated in a politically volatile climate, the theory laid greater stress on the operations of ideology and power on human subjectivity.
