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Proto-Indo-European language - Wikipedia

No direct record of Proto-Indo-European has been discovered; its proposed features have been derived by linguistic reconstruction from documented Indo-European languages. Far more work has gone into reconstructing PIE than any other proto-language.

Proto-Indo-European - Omniglot

Proto-Indo-European (PIE) is the reconstructed ancestor of the Indo-European languages. It is thought that PIE was spoken during the late Neolithic and Early Bronze Age - about 4500 - 2500 BC, possibly in Pontic-Caspian steppe north of the Black Sea.

Proto-Indo-European (often shortened to PIE) has been linguistically reconstructed from existing Indo-European languages, and no record of it exists as its speakers did not have writing. The language was probably spoken about 6,000 years ago, although some scholars have argued for an earlier date.

Ancient-DNA analyses identify a Caucasus Lower Volga people as the ancient originators of Proto-Indo-European, the precursor to the massive Indo-European language family. The population lived on the Eurasian steppe within the borders of current-day Russia during the Copper Age about 6,500 years ago, data show.

This hypothetical, but strongly evidenced language, is called Proto-Indo-European. The first stage of Indo-European study was the broad classification work that established many of the well-accepted groups of Indo-European languages.
