Passive se constructions are one way of using the passive voice in Spanish. Only transitive verbs (verbs that require a direct object) are used in passive se constructions.

what are the uses of se (with accent) and se (without accent)?

The impersonal 'se' is the English equivalent of 'one' / 'people.' and refers to an unidentified human agent. It is always singular and only uses intransitive verbs and 'objectless' transitive verbs.
