Glomar responses are commonly associated with the United States Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), which generally dictates how federal agencies must disclose information. The term "Glomar" originated in association with the FOIA law.

Case in point: the term "Glomar" is often used to describe a FOIA response where the agency neither confirms nor denies (NCND) the existence of responsive records. Knowing where this term comes from can help understand why agencies issue this type of response.

The Glomar response arose from a 1975 FOIA request to the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) inquiring about the agency's operation to employ a recovery vessel—known as the Hughes Glomar Explorer—to recover a sunken Soviet nuclear submarine.
